#### **USAID**<sup>1</sup>

KEY

- Across developing countries, women make up 43% of the agricultural labor force.
- One in 5 girls in developing countries who enroll in primary school never complete their education.
- Women comprise only 18.9% of the world's legislators.
- Globally, 1 in 7 girls is married before she turns 15.
- Globally, 1 in 3 women will experience gender-based violence in their lifetime.
- Each year, more than 287,000 women 99% of which live in developing countries die from pregnancy- and childbirth-related complications.

## **UNITED NATIONS<sup>2</sup>**

- Every week, approximately 7,000 adolescent girls and young women from the ages of 15 and 24 become newly infected with HIV.
- Women in sub-Saharan Africa collectively spend roughly 40 billion hours a year collecting water.
- Research indicates that when more income is put into the hands of women, child nutrition, health, and education all improve.

#### UNICEF

- Around the world, approximately 129 million girls are out of school.
- In countries affected by conflict, girls are more than twice as likely to be out of school than girls living in non-affected countries.
- Every year, roughly 12 million girls are married before they turn 18.
- Globally, an estimated 15% of young women give birth before they turn 18.
- Despite evidence of declines, around 1 in 3 girls from the ages of 15 and 19 have undergone female genital mutilation or circumcision in countries where it is practiced.

## **THE WORLD BANK<sup>4</sup>**

- Globally, more than 736 million people live on less than \$1.90 per day.
- Four of 5 people living below the poverty line live in rural areas.
- Women and children represent the majority of the poor in most regions.
- More than half of the world's extremely poor live in sub-Saharan Africa.
